L.M.V.C'S ACADEMIC PROGRESS

Academically Lords Meade Vocational College is improving, having produced one of the best results in the district last academic year.

There were good individual performances from students at both 'O' level and 'A' level. Those who excelled at 'A' levels have prospects of being admitted in tertiary institutions on government sponsorship.

Some of the students who contacted us hailed their teachers for their academic success while Mr. Mark Malinga, the school's Director of Studies attributed the school's gradual improvement to hard work from the teaching staff, and he promised for better results at the end of this year.

SECOND TERM

The second term for 2006 academic year began on the 22nd May. It always involves many activities including games and sports. Academically this is the term in which all candidate classes sit for their mock exams. It will close on 18th August.

VOLUNTEER TEACHERS FROM UK

In January L.M.V.C received two volunteer teachers from the United Kingdom, Sam Chilvers and Holly Laceby from Wolverhampton Grammar School. They completed their six months teaching experience in Uganda and returned to UK on the 18th June. We are very grateful for their work at the College – Sam taught Art and geography, while Holly taught English and Geography.

Apart from the class work, Sam got involved with the boys in games and sports, while Holly helped with the cataloging of all the books in the Library - the same books which were donated by Wolverhampton Grammar School and the Rotary Club of Wolverhampton. During their stay in the College, the students revealed having found the two teachers interesting, inspiring and encouraging to them. It was great having them around for that time, and they have left a big gap! We look forward to seeing them again in Jinja, and wish them well in their further studies.

LORDS MEADE COLLEGE GETS A GENERATOR

Following the kind donation the College received from Val Chilvers (Wolverhampton Grammar School), the College administration decided use the money to buy a generator, to reduce on the effects of the daily power cuts we are currently facing in the whole country. Students can now use more valuable time studying at night and also during early morning preps, which wasn't possible before. Mr. Peter Johnston (Wolverhampton Grammar School) handed over the generator on behalf of the donors during his visit to the College. It bears the inscription "May the light never go out on education".

This generator is capable of lighting both the original 8 classrooms as well as the boys' dormitories. However another generator is needed to light both the girls' dormitories as well as the other classrooms.

TOFTA BENEFICIARIES VOLUNTEERING AT LMVC.

This term Lords Meade Vocational College received five teachers doing their voluntary teaching practice at the school. All of them passed through Lords Meade Vocational College, and two of them are former beneficiaries of Tofta Education Trust.

We are proud to see our children coming back to do their teaching practice with us.

VISITORS

The Tofta Trust and Lords Meade Vocational College continues to thank all their beloved visitors who have called at the office and at the school. In April, among the many visitors we received, was Rotarian Neville Hackett, a past Director of Rotary International. He commended our director, Rtn John Kirkwood and the school administration for the work well done having seen the progress made by the school. He was accompanied by Past District Governor Rotarian Henry Kyemba.

Rotary Group Study Exchange team from District 5340, San Diego, also visited the college in early May. This was a group of teachers who were warmly welcomed by the headmaster and the director. They were taken around the school and they also interacted with the students.

They were especially keen to see the projects that Rotary Clubs in their District had donated. These projects include the construction of a borehole, which is a great boost. Their District also assisted in buying laboratory equipments, and also to acquire new text books for the library. During their stay with us in Jinja, they attended Rotary fellowship.

We were also blessed by the visit of a second Group Study Exchange, this time from District 5330, Palm Springs, California. Being a medical team they were especially interested in the Farnfield Medical Centre.

GAEL RILEY BIRTHDAY FUNDS PROVIDE 45 BEDS FOR GIRLS

Gael Riley, a long time personal friend to the director, raised funds at her birthday celebration earlier this year. She decided to send all the proceeds to LMVC. These funds were spent on more triple decker beds for the girls, and now 45 more girls are able to sleep comfortably on the new beds and enjoy the boarding facilities.



L.M.V.C. STUDENTS BUILD NEW HOUSE FOR A WIDOW

During the first term students started a voluntary project. The students organized themselves and started building a house for a widow who stays a couple of miles away from the College. She had a house built in traditional mud and sticks, but it was in a very sorry state. She cares for many of her grandchildren as most of her children have died. The Headmaster and members of staff mobilize and supervise while the students build and solicit for funds for the building materials from themselves and from the staff.

Please keep up that voluntary spirit to the community – which needs a lot of such voluntary projects.



VISITORS FROM JOHN LYON SCHOOL, HARROW.

A group of 17 students and 5 staff members have spent 5 days in July at LMVC as part of their World Adventure holiday program. During this time they have assisted in the construction of 2 classrooms (left) made using the new compressed murram block

technology. They have also interacted with the LMVC students by playing football, cricket and rugby. All the students enjoyed a 'cultural exchange evening' where songs and plays were put on by both lots of students. We have greatly enjoyed hosting them, and we are most grateful for their input into the development of the College.

HAILEYBURY TRUST PROJECT

We are delighted that the Haileybury Trust has selected to work with LMVC in a project of appropriate technology – making interlocking building blocks using murram & cement. The project has already produced several thousand blocks which have gone into the construction of 2 semi-detached 2 bed roomed houses. These will be used for staff accommodation when they are completed in August.

The interlocking blocks mean that less cement is used in construction, and these blocks have been used by the World Adventure group in the construction of the 2 new classrooms.

The Haileybury Trust project will also include the construction of another 2 classroom block, which will greatly ease the current congestion in the classrooms.

Part of this project is aimed at making rain water harvesting tanks so that water can be collected off the roofs of the buildings with the aim of having a beneficial effect on the environment.

It is hoped that the technology will spread in Uganda and have an impact on the environment as it means that the clay bricks are no longer required, and hence the demand for firewood will diminish. The production of the blocks is currently being carried out by some of the students.

A further aspect of this project is that it is hoped that when a new course in appropriate technology is started at Makerere University the Trust will sponsor 2 students from LMVC on this course.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION AT COPENHAGEN

Directors John Kirkwood and Peter Kalibbala traveled to Copenhagen for the Rotary International Convention during June. They manned a booth 'KIDS IN CLASS' for the Rotary Club of Jinja that also advertised the work of both Tofta Educational Trust and LMVC. They greatly enjoyed meeting their Rotarian friends from all over the world and meeting other Rotarians who showed interest in the projects. Director John was delighted when a friend gave him some money to assist Caesar Nyeko with his fees. They enjoyed a few days exploring parts of Copenhagen and visiting Helsingor as well as Helsingborg in Sweden.

UK TRIP

On their return Directors John & Peter spent 10 days in England during which they visited the following Rotary Clubs that have kindly supported LMVC – Wolverhampton, Odiham & Hook, andBolton Lever. They also visited Wolverhampton Grammar School and King Alfred's College at Wantage to further cement the existing links. Apparently the hire car company was not happy that they covered over 1000 miles in a week!



CAESAR NYEKO

Caesar was abducted by the Lords Resistance Army in 2001 He served as a 'rebel' for 15 months until he was able to escape. During this time his father was murdered by the rebels. The Ugandan Army asked him to serve with them, but he dreamt of pursuing his education. A friend of his late father has been sponsoring him at LMVC, but recently this friend had to retire resulting in Caesar spending a lot of time out of class looking for fees. Caesar can now look forward to a year of uninterrupted education.

AIDS 2006 CONVENTION

Director John and Kenyan students' liaison officer, Jack Ocholla, will be attending the AIDS 2006 Convention in Toronto, where they will have a booth advertising the work of Tofta Educational Trust as well as Lords Meade Vocational College in educating the orphans left behind by the HIV / AIDS scourge. They will also take the opportunity to visit Rotary Clubs in the Edmonton and Calgary areas before the Convention, and Toronto and London areas after the Convention, also to advertise the Trust & College's work. We wish them a successful trip.

KENNAIR FOUNDATION

Richard Kennair is setting up the Kennair Foundation in Canada. The Foundation will be handling donations from Canada towards the sponsorships of needy students and also the development of the College.
